Before launching a new painting project, the first step is proper preparation of the fabric. Director Katerina Lanfranco, who teaches painting at Hunter College in New York, has uploaded two free videos (covering Canvas Stretching and Canvas Priming) to her YouTube channel. Both tutorials are really about best practices for producing an effective fabric. Lanfranco will guide you through the materials you need to set, including a ruler, scissors and stretchers or sieve bars, and will clearly guide you through the process of cutting the fabric correctly and attaching to the thongs. Next comes the primer: the use of gesso creates a flexible surface that receives the paint well and allows it to be spread more efficiently. Lanfranco outlines process materials such as gesso brush, gesso brush and sandpaper (to sand the surface after each layer to make the fabric smooth and ready to be painted) – and takes you with step-by-step instructions. By the end of the course, you'll have a canvas ready to paint. Interested in experimenting or refining your acrylic painting skills? Artist Will Kemp writes on his YouTube channel and creates his own videos of classic painting techniques, focusing on the use of acrylic paint. Whether you're just getting started or have a more ambitious project in mind, Will's videos offer different strategies for the instrument. Start with simple basic construction parts, including proper cleaning of acrylic brush, choice of acrylic brush, use of acrylic-coloured plots and basics of mixing colors. Along with various videos about proper color mixing, Will also sets you up with a series of painting rituals ranging from beginner to advanced skill set. Learn the basics of painting set life with acrylic gunman techniques from multi-part beginners, learn about light and shadow techniques, and try your hand at acrylic landscape painting, palette knife techniques, portraits, sky painting, flower positions, and even painting in the style of Claude Monet. And best of all, it's all free. Watercolours have a reputation as a difficult painting industry. This beginner watercolour course from Udemy builds self-confidence for new painters, gives you the tools to master the basics and leads with a playful approach to the media. All you need is a box of watercolour berries, one round brush, watercolor paper, black ink or felt pen, pen, eraser, bright or white wax candle or crayon and two cans of water. Created by Nicola A. Blakemore, the course (about \$100) includes four hours of on-demand video, and you can even use course materials on a TV or mobile phone. The goal of the class is simple – to teach you how watercolour paints work with water and how to harness them efficiently. Blakemore's class helps you understand the principle of color washing, how the same colors can create shape and shading, how you can create highlights and shadows using watercolours, and how to color paintings correctly. Founded in 1929, the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA) has some of the world's most famous modern paintings. While visitors have lined up to see Vincent Van Gogh in the Starry Sky or the masterpieces of Jackson Pollock and Willem de Kooning, the museum now has online programming that you can use at home. While MoMA offers a variety of free online courses exploring a variety of artistic disciplines, In the Studio: Postwar Abstract Painting focuses on the materials, techniques and conceptual processes of seven New York school artists: de Kooning, Pollock, Yayoi Kusama, Agnes Martin, Barnett Newman, Ad Reinhardt and Mark Rothko. The free course is set up so that you can work at your own pace and schedule. Your director will lead you through studio and gallery introductions and give readings that give context to the larger cultural, intellectual and historical events that shaped these artists after World War II. The class also includes a variety of optional studio exercises for which you need art supplies. These will hopefully inspire your own abstract paintings. Interested in doing a hobby of the style that created Leonardo da Vinci's Mona Lisa and Picasso's Les Femmes d'Alger? In oil painting, pigments with drying oils such as flaxseeds or poppy seed oil are used as a binder. If you're a beginner, French artist Florent Farges has a variety of video tutorials on his YouTube channel to help you get the ball rolling with your oil painting instructions. Farges follows the teachings of the studio method from the 19th century. The best place to start is oil painting for beginners, which is free. Here, Florent strives for simplicity. He guides you on what exactly it means and how each paint tone illustrates it – with a palette of colors in his palette. Jobson then begins his mixing demonstration: a collision course in the nuances of a process that will surely set you up for success. Gouache is a water-based media with a heavier pigment load than watercolour, so it's designed to be opaque. In this video, artist Minnie Small breaks down the basics of gouache. If you have experience with watercolours, gouache can be the next style of painting you want to play with. As Small explains in the free video, many watercolor tools, such as the brush type, also work for gouache. Minnie illustrates the varying velviness of the paint, as well as its various beneficial properties, such as velvety matte surface, fast drying time and the fact that it can be reactivated with water after drying.
